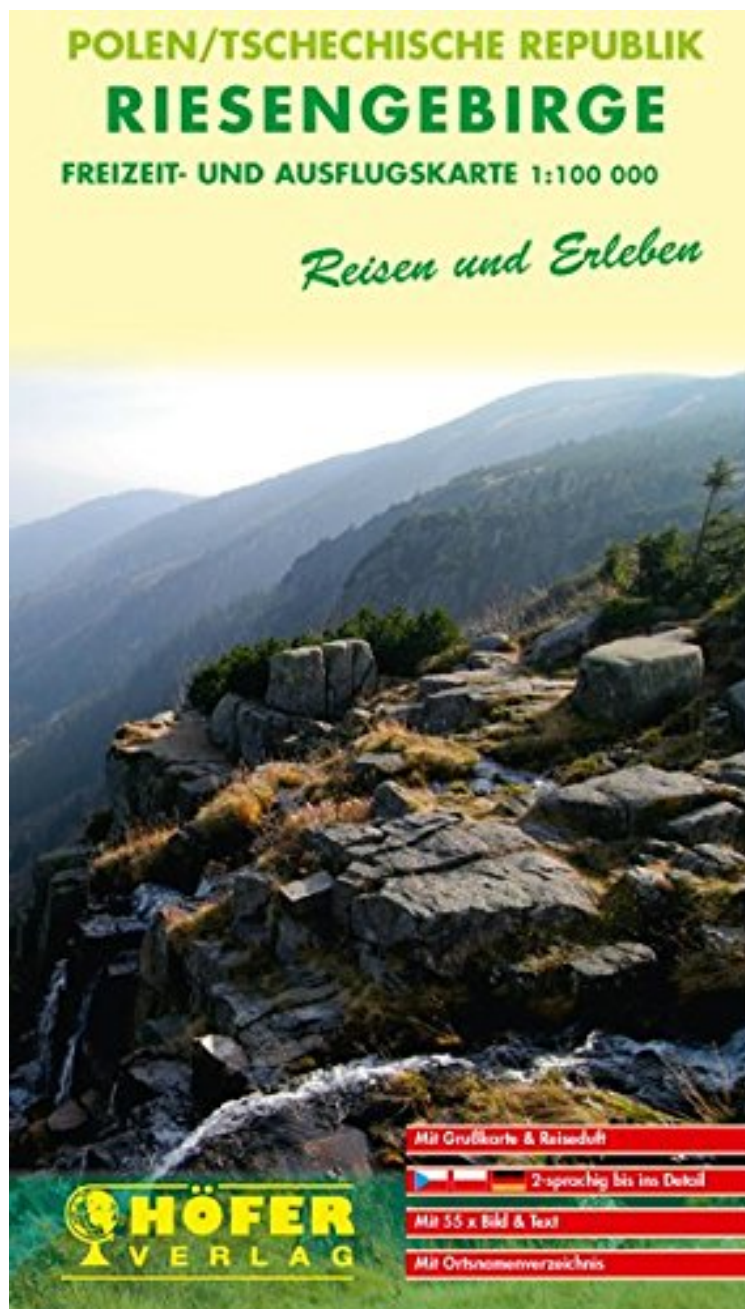

Poland, Czech Republic Giant Mtns. 1:100,000 bilingual reference map HOEFERThis map covers the Krkonose / Karkonosze / Riesengebirge mountain range between the Czech Republic and Poland, a part of so-called Sudetenland, showing the areas of German population prior to 1945. The map shows current situation and place names in both Czech / Polish (current) and German (pre-1945) where appropriate. This series of modern road maps is a great resource for finding villages in former areas with pre-WWII German minorities, now in Poland, Russia or the Czech Republic. The maps show communities in two languages - German and Polish, Russian or Czech, depending on the area - that is the old and current name. The PL and RS maps are indexed, using the German names. These maps help solve the confusion of the place name changes in Central and Eastern Europe of the 20th century. And, since they are modern, they can also be used when planning current travel in those areas. These maps are highly recommended for family tree research. Use them as a quick cross-reference in your research -- you don't have to check two different sources to see the old and new names.
