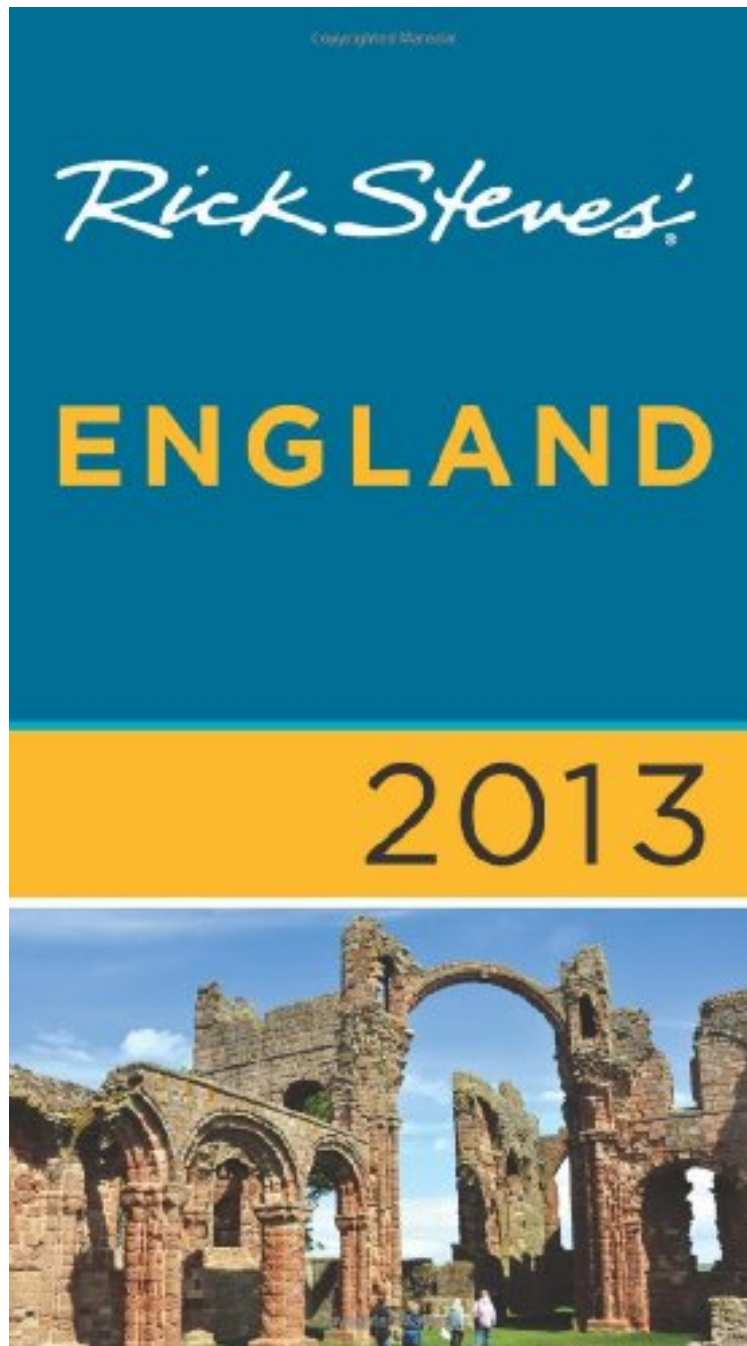

By Taco Monster Rick Steve's England 2013 has impressive coverage over many topics of interest to travelers wanting more than just "to see" the country, but "to know" more of the country. In addition to extensive coverage on London, getting into town from its airports, suggested itineraries for visits of varying lengths, organizing accommodations and dining by neighborhood, throughout the book he offers insider tips that rarely make their way to guidebooks. This book is great for those who want to escape hotel chain cookie cutter sameness. Its impossible to cover the wide range of this well researched easy-to-use book, but here are a few samples: ... 2-pages of key tourist site summaries in London... 15 pages of options for getting around London... What to do on London Sunday when most things are closed... On pubs and BBs which ... proprietors are chatty -- freely share local knowledge of sites, history, etc.... 12 pages on transportation options pros/cons/saving money/surprising tips. Eg: if renting a car, how to get traffic alerts on your car radio just like locals, surprising CDW pitfalls... 9 pages on communication, nearly free And pricey area codes, etc.... discounts available from some eating and sleeping locations by mention of the book... the features could go on and on, on the whole very helpful.... useful packing list for international travel... local holidays Geographically, this book covers the many popular tourist interests extensively, although it does not reach every corner of England. What's there -- major inclusions: London. Bath and nearby. Blackpool. Brighton and nearby. Canterbury. Cotswolds, The. Cornwall. Dartmoor. Dover, Southeast England. Durham, Northeast England. Greenwich, Windsor, Cambridge. Ironbridge George. Lake District. Liverpool. North Yorkshire. Oxford. Portsmouth. Stratford-on-Avon. Warwick, Coventry. York All the above should cover the hankerings of most every first or even second time visitor. There are particular areas I would have loved to find (below), but even without this is an excellent book.. Birmingham (England's second largest city). East Anglia eg Kings Lynn, Norwich -- historical and tourist sites are less dense here but they exist. East Midlands eg Nottingham with Sherwood Forest. St Ives near Cambridge, although he covers its namesake in Cornwall. By NMI don't normally write reviews on things and I am not a die hard Rick Steve's fan, but I felt this book was extremely helpful in planning my independent vacation to England so that's why I felt like writing a review. Ways in which I felt this book helped me out: I was at a loss in planning my trip to the UK in that I did not know the best way to get from city A to city B and this book is very helpful in giving you info on how to do that, whether it be public transport (rail and bus) or car. Second, he gives a list of the major tourist sites to see in each city including their opening times and cost and different options in viewing these sites such as by self walking tour, guided tour, or tourist bus, etc. All this info is very up to date for 2013. He also gives a list of accommodations (not complete but a good starting point) to consider in each city including high, medium, and low cost rooms. Then he gives a lot of tips on certain tourist traps to avoid or his opinion on sites which he felt were a waste of time or not worth the money. He does include some basic handdrawn maps of each city which is a good reference and gives you a good general layout of the city. If you are planning a trip to England independently meaning without much of a guide, I highly recommend this book. I also took a quick look at Lonely Planet's Great Britain, but did not think it was as good as this book and found it had less useful information. If you are planning a trip to Scotland or Ireland as well, I would check out Rick Steve's Great Britain book as his England book does not include these countries. 4 of 4 people found the following review helpful. In short, I'd be thrilled to look up from my mushy peas and see Rick striding across the pub floor to our table - I won't give up hope, either (but I may give up on the peas).
