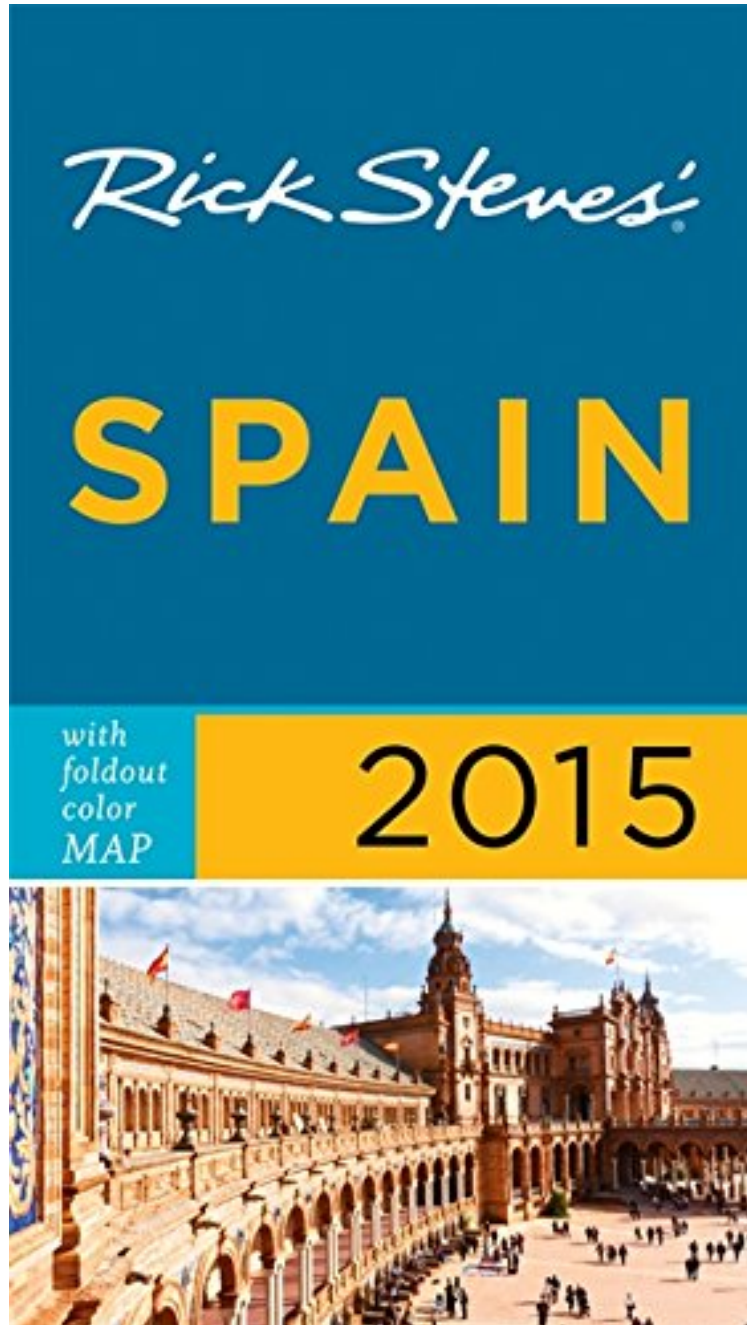

We used this one a little more than the other book, mostly because it did offer some suggestions about things that you wouldn't have otherwise known. For example, you can get in free to some museums after a certain time. I did find that a lot of the book seemed to go into detailed information regarding certain things and places that really seemed to just be a space filler. For example, Rick goes into great detail about certain art at the Prada in Madrid and how to tour the museum to see the art. I felt this was mostly unnecessary as you can get the audio tour thing that will tell you all about the art and the museum provides a map that lists where all the masterpieces are located anyway. As in the other book we got, Rick does highlight bigger cities and what most people think they should see in Spain. However, for those who take the road less traveled this book will not be the most helpful. Some of the places we came across didn't even get a mention in this book, but they should have... Don't limit yourself to the where to eat and where to stay suggestions. You will find lots and lots of options especially in the bigger cities. The last thing I will mention is that Rick notes to feel free to cut out the pages you want and take with you so you don't have to carry the entire book with you. Ok, as someone who just loves books in general- I find this horrifying.
