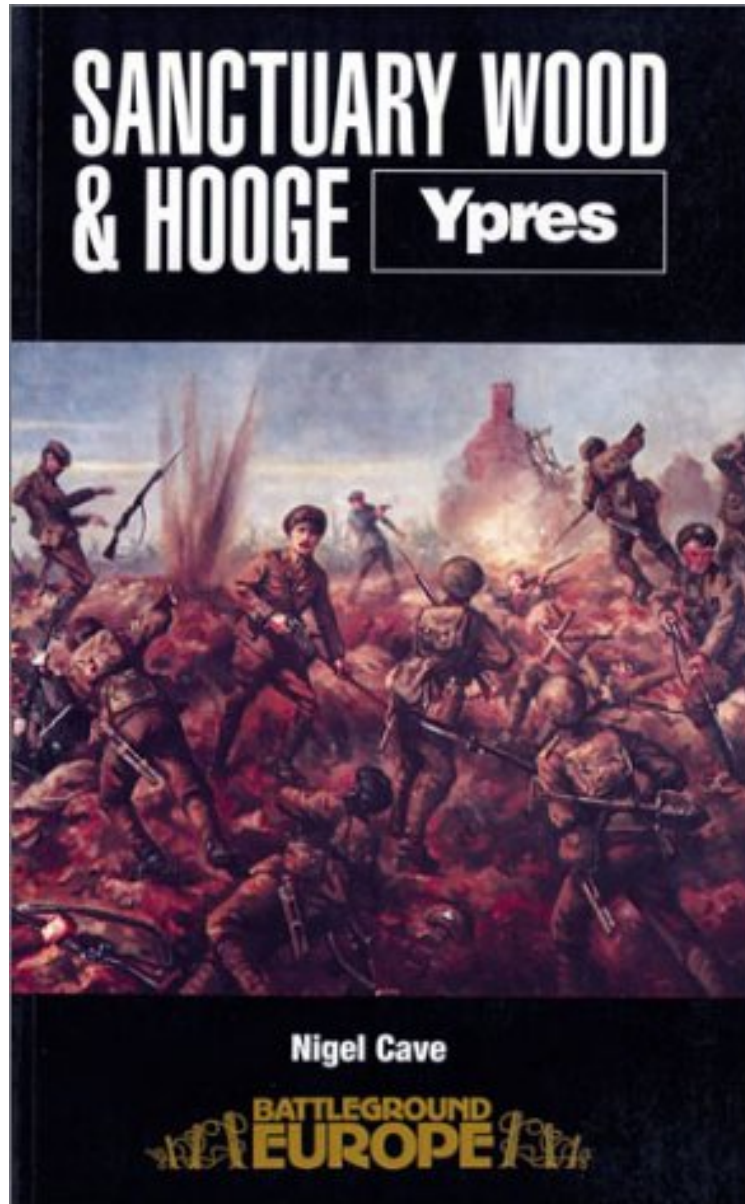

Battleground Europe guides are fabulous whether you are a tourist with a curiosity or a scholar with a passion! I will probably never see these battlefields but these guides authored so capably by Nigel Cave and others will transport me back in time to see and experience what they were like. Nigel Cave has had a lifelong passion for touring World War One battlefields since his first experience at Hill 62, (covered in this volume!) in 1968. Other highlights include the Hooge Crater and the first German flamethrower attack against the British. This volume covers just a portion of the battlefield known as the Ypres salient in 1915-1916. There are other volumes dedicated to other facets of the battles of Ypres. Cave has authored and edited many of these guide books which are loaded with pictures, maps, and diagrams as well as practical touring information! I highly recommend these books to anyone with a curiosity or passion for World War One battles.

Both Sanctuary Wood and the village of Hodge saw intense fighting during the First World War. Nigel Cave takes the reader on an explanatory tour of the immediate area. Included is a description of the museum at Hill 62 with its trench system, stereoscopic photos and weapons.
